#### **Key Goals of the Programs:**

- Equip students with the necessary English skills to ensure smooth and seamless integration into school life — inside and outside the classroom.
- Support students in developing a high level of English proficiency to access learning in mainstream classes with minimal EAL assistance.
- Provide a holistic education that allows students to engage in a range of specialist programs, including outdoor education, and after-school programs.

From Prep onwards, AIS offers tailored language support based on individual needs, ensuring all students have the necessary resources to succeed.

Our EAL program plays a crucial role in international university preparation for Secondary students, empowering them with the language and academic skills needed to pursue higher education at their preferred universities.

#### **Elementary: Prep to Year 5**

Elementary EAL programs are available for students in Prep to Year 5 EAL. Entry criteria at each year level ensure students are on track to enter Year 6 programs successfully.

#### **Intensive English Stream (IES)**

- Full-year-level homeroom (all students in the class are learning English as an additional language)
- Intensive teaching and learning to accelerate English language acquisition
- Additional educators to support foundational reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills in the classroom
- Students usually exit within one year based on English proficiency test scores, observation and assessments
- Range of students from diverse backgrounds with minimal English language proficiency
- Students typically graduate this program and enter the mainstream class in one year or less

### English as an Additional Language (EAL) in the Mainstream

- Students of varying levels of English proficiency in the homeroom from beginner to native
- EAL Beginner and Transitioning levels students receive varying levels of withdrawal (pull-out) and co-teaching (push-in) support based on the student's English proficiency and year level
- Language support is timetabled during different blocks during the school day
- After graduating from the EAL support program, students are monitored and continue to receive differentiated support from their homeroom teacher
- Exiting support can take 1-3+ years depending on year level, prior exposure and student engagement

#### IES & EAL in the Mainstream

- Aligned with the IB PYP and Australian Curriculum
- Complete range of specialist programs weekly: Music, Mandarin, Art, Library sessions and Physical Education
- Focus on inquiry-based learning and fostering global citizenship
- Extensive optional after-school programs (CCAs)

## What are the differences between withdrawal (pull-out), co-teaching (push-in) and the Intensive English Stream support models?

- Intensive English stream: Intensive program that focuses on accelerated English language acquisition
- Withdrawal/Pull-out support: Students leave the homeroom to receive small group targeted support for English Language Acquisition
- Co-teaching/Push-in support: EAL Teachers join the homeroom class for targeted lessons and skills in English

#### Why IES vs Mainstream?

- Students in IES receive foundational language support with 1-2 additional educators (depending on class size) in the classroom to accelerate language acquisition.
- Students in mainstream classes have a stronger foundation in functional English and often a greater proficiency in academic English

### **Language Entry Requirements**

Students placement is based on one or more of the following:

- Pearson TELL (Elementary)
- iTEP SLATE (Secondary)
- Interviews
- Reports
- Teacher References

#### **Secondary**

Secondary EAL mainstream and sheltered programs are available for students years 6-10. EAL support is not available in Years 11 or 12. Intensive programs are available for years 6-9 only. Entry criteria at each year level ensure students are on track to enter IGCSE, IBDP or HSC programs.

#### FAQ:

#### 1. What is the difference between ESSPP and IGCSE?

ESSPP is a modified curriculum with IGCSE subjects which focus on language acquisition and content. Students not in ESSPP have a higher level of English and can access the program without support.

#### 2. Can students change between ESSPP and full IGCSE programs?

Both options are two years, students can't switch between them.

#### 3. How are students prepared for the IB or HSC by ESSPP?

The curriculum covers ATLs (Approaches to Learning) and Extended Essay elements to prepare for the IBDP or HSC option. Students have the skills to learn independently and practice in-depth research-style essays.

#### 4. Can students in Year 9 PCS take IGCSE courses?

No, the students enrolled in PCS do not meet the English-level requirements for the ESSPP program at the time of admission. However, they may be eligible for some IGCSE if they graduate from PCS quickly.







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
